

Mandatory Military Service

“The ultimate measure of a man is not where he stands in moments of comfort and convenience, but where he stands at times of challenge and controversy. The true neighbor will risk his position, his prestige, and even his life for the welfare of others.” (Martin Luther King Jr., Letter from Birmingham Jail). Being a citizen of the United States comes with many rights, but that then means that to defend those rights you must commit yourself to military service. Martin Luther King explains that being a citizen and having rights comes from those who fight for them. To prove dedication to a country through mandatory military service is an idea that goes back to Rome and Greece when they conquered nations. They were nations who controlled other civilizations and had huge armies; they would require a percentage of the civilizations’ occupants to join the military and in turn grant citizenship to those people. Our nation did not have mandatory military service until 1943 during WW2 when America imposed a draft which randomly picked young men to join the army instead of them volunteering.
